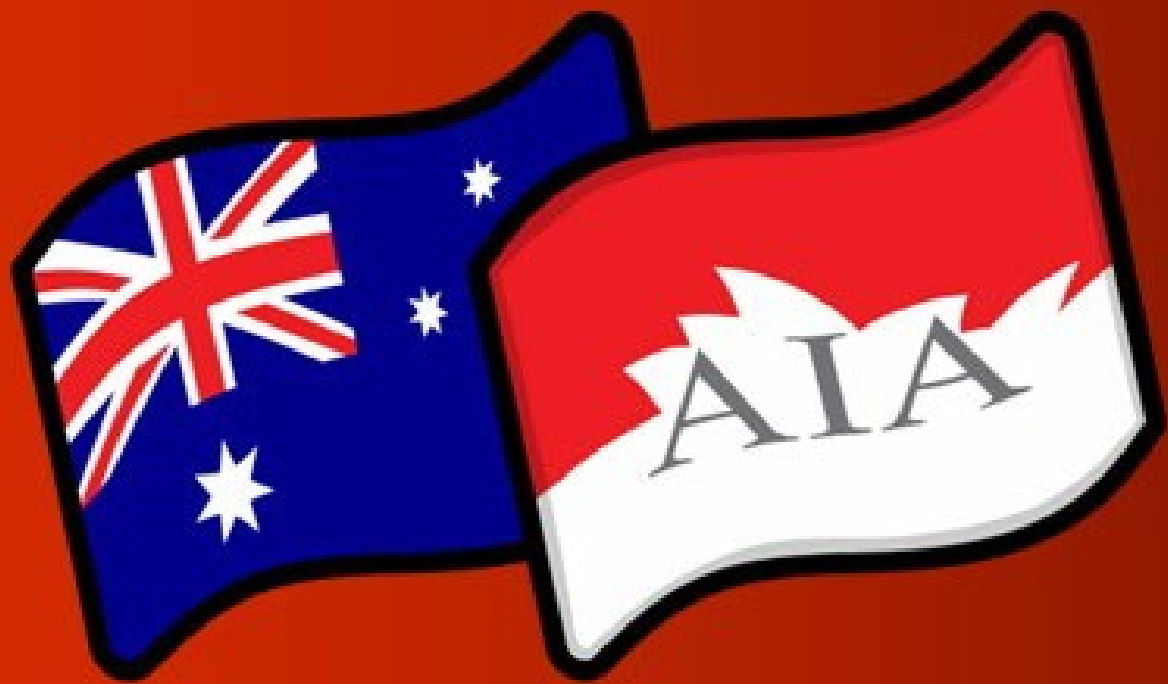

# President's Report 2024

As we begin AIA's 80<sup>th</sup> year of working to maintain and enhance the relationship between Australia and Indonesia on various cultural and historical levels, I reflect on the 79<sup>th</sup> year and the noble effort of our small committee of seven (7) members who generously give of their time for the benefit of AIA.

In summary, 2024 AIA activities included:

- The Lottie Maramis Awards and Prize were awarded to four (4) HSC students who achieved 1<sup>st</sup> place in the four Indonesian courses.
- Membership dropped off a from 159 to 122.
- Book sales continued from a number of bookshops on consignment throughout 2025, in particular the Australian National Library shop.
- AIA made a nominal donation to the Blue Scope Youth Orchestra which performed in Bali to a number of audiences.
- AIA also sponsored (in kind) and was promoted at the Geotourism Conference Workshop held at the University of Sydney.
- AIA presented the story behind "Indonesia Calling" and the Black Armada at the Manly Manado Society's Independence celebrations
- We were well represented at the Indonesian Independence Day ceremony at Kensington Oval
- Teamed up with VP Isla Winarto in Jakarta to visit and distribute food packs to disadvantaged old people in Meteng as well as primary school children in a scavenger community in East Jakarta.
- AIA Winter Warung lunch at Sedap Rasa Restaurant in Kingsford in August.
- Memorial wreath-laying ceremony celebrating Hero's Day at Cowra's POW Cemetery.
- AIA provide the two becaks at the "Indonesia by the Beach" festival held in the Bondi Pavillion
- Funded 10 Primary school scholarships in the ANZA program for disadvantaged Jakarta-based Indonesian children
- Arrange the traditional Farewell Harbour Cruise lunch for Konjen Pak Vedi and his wife Ibu Fannie.

Once again, I am extremely grateful for the support AIA receives from the Indonesian Consulate consuls and staff (headed up by Consul General Bapak Vedi Buana), and the Indonesian Embassy consuls headed up by His Excellency Dr. Siswo Pramono.

## Membership

By March of 2024, AIA membership had reached 159 including 22 in Indonesia. During 2025, 36 members did not renew their membership and the last count takes the number to 123, which includes the 26 members now signed up in Indonesia. The AIA committee would welcome suggestions and recommendations from its membership on what they expect from the organisation so that we can increase their interest and involvement in AIA activities.

## Book Sales

Book sales continued from a number of bookshops on consignment throughout 2025,

in particular the Australian National Library shop. However, sales in the second half of 2024 slowed and a number of book shops have indicated they do not wish to re-stock “Anton & Me” or “Refugees & Rebels”.

Currently, we have in stock 117 copies of Anton & Me and 4 copies of Refugees & Rebels.

### **Blue Scope Youth Orchestra**

In July, AIA made a nominal donation to the Blue Scope Youth Orchestra which performed in Bali to a number of audiences. The funds were used to help with transporting the young musicians around Bali.

The Orchestra originated from Wollongong and sponsored by Blue Scope Steel. One concert was held in Ubud which was attended by our Vice-President, Isla Winarto. The orchestra was accompanied by an Indonesian Youth Choir.

## Geofest

In July, AIA was involved in organising the 2024 GEOFEST workshop held at Sydney University. This international geotourism workshop was an Australian-Indonesian collaboration project as a post conference event of the 5th Geotourism Festival and International Conference hosted by the Indonesian Geoparks Network held earlier in Lombok in June.

The theme of the workshop is 'Volcano as a World Class Sustainable Geotourism Destination'. This international event attracted over 100 delegates including geoscientists, environmental professionals, educators, students, professionals, tourism planners, managers, operators, and anyone involved in nature tourism. The workshop featured international speakers from Australia, Indonesia, and New Zealand. AIA assisted in organising the travel and accommodation for the Indonesian participants which included the Bupati from Banyuwangi, East Java who delivered a presentation on the Ijen Geopark.

AIA also organised for the Indonesian Ambassador to Australia, Pak Siswo Pramono to deliver the Official Welcome at the Workshop, and he was accompanied by Konjen Pak Vedi Buana and a number of Consuls as well.

The guests at the Gala Dinner were entertained by two Balinese dancers, also organised by AIA.

The Australian Geoscience Council, the peak council for all Australian Geoscientists and their respective organisations, reported that the workshop was a great success in bringing distinguished speakers from Indonesian and Australia together to discuss share their experiences in developing Geoparks in their respective countries. A special mention was also made acknowledging the valuable assistance from AIA with

organising and caring for the Indonesian contingent, and providing a taste of Indonesian culture to Sydney University.







## MMS

The Manly Manado Society (MMS) invited AIA to tell the story of “Indonesia Calling” and the Black Armada at a showing of the video at their Indonesian Independence Day celebrations. VP Isla Winarto, Anthony Liem and myself attended the function and presented our story of Australia aiding Indonesians to gain their Independence in 1945 in Sydney. We were accompanied by Konjen Pak Vedi and Ibu Fannie, as well as Consul Pak Theo who is originally from Manado.

Anthony provided the 6 banners explaining the Black Armada and I sold copies of Anton & Me to MMS members. There are great interest in keeping our two organisations in touch with each other so we may share our experiences and events with our respective members.

There is a plan to show Indonesia Calling in Manado in mid-2025 and AIA Jakarta-based members may attend on our behalf.

## Indonesian Independence Day

Many AIA Committee and members attended the incredible formal celebrations of Indonesia’s Independence Day at Kensington Oval. It was encouraging and heart warming to see a large contingent of proud Indonesian students from USYD, UNSW and UTS attend the ceremony.



I would highly recommend you all to attend this ceremony in 2025, especially if it is held at the same venue which is ideal to hold large numbers of Indonesians and interested non-Indonesians as it was a very moving ceremony with Indonesian military and Government representatives performing traditional routines in honour of such a proud day.

### Indonesia Visit

In early July, I had the opportunity to visit Jakarta after attending the Geotourism Conference in Lombok. AIA's VP, Isla Winarto, arranged for us the following AIA-related appointments:

- A luncheon with AIA members gave us the opportunity to get to know each other more personally and better understand how we can work together on future AIA events both in Indonesia and in Australia.
- Meeting with Australian Embassy staff to discuss plans for celebrating AIA's 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary in 2025, including a Memorial at the Bondon graves and a luncheon with the new Ambassador.



We presented the staff with copies of *Anton & Me* and *Refugees & Rebels* to be placed in the Embassy's library for their reference. We were given 20 copies of the Embassy's book "Australia & Indonesia Struggle for Independence" by Martin O'Hare and Anthony Reid.

We attended an informal meeting of Jakarta-based AIA members at the Lovebirds Café owned by AIA member, Greg Redden and his wife. At this meeting, we attracted two more new members to join AIA. I gave a brief speech on AIA, its history and its activities in Australia.



Isla and I visited a social welfare program which provides food to elderly people who live in Menteng, are over 60 years of age and have no family to take care of them. We took food packs and distributed them to each and everyone of them, some of them in wheelchairs. An experience to behold.







A more awakening experience was our visit to a scavenger village in East Jakarta. People who have come from other islands in Indonesia to Jakarta have established themselves in villages on the outskirts of Jakarta and provide a “rubbish collection” service to clean the streets of rubbish. The rubbish is placed in large plastic bags and collected by garbage trucks to disposal.

The children of these villages do not have Birth Certificates as their parents are not from Jakarta, and without these certificates, the children are not allowed to attend schools. Schooling is provided by trained schoolteachers on a voluntary basis. We visited one such school and again provided food packs to each child.



## Cowra – Hero’s Day



This year a small group of AIA members visited Cowra to celebrate Indonesia's Heroes Day by commemorating the 13 Indonesian Freedom Fighters that lay to rest in the Cowra POW cemetery. They were amongst 1200 Indonesians who were mistakenly incarcerated in the Cowra Prisoner of War camp in 1944.

The commemoration commenced on Saturday afternoon with the ringing of the Peace Bell where we reflected on the symbolism of the bell and the words "Never Again". This was followed by a wonderful dinner held at the Japanese Garden restaurant in AIA's honour by the Cowra Council. Speeches were made and gifts exchanged.

On Sunday morning, AIA was joined for the wreath laying ceremony at the graves of the 13 Indonesians by The Mayor (Paul Smith) Cowra Shire Councillors, Michael McCormack MP (Riverina), the Deputy Chief of Mission from the Indonesian Embassy, The Consul General, Pak Vedi and a number of Consuls from KJRI Sydney, as well as Imam Emil Idad and Students of Irian Jaya, studying in Australian universities in Sydney.

Imam Emil spoke well of the significance of the 13 Indonesians buried in Cowra and prayed for peace in English, Arabic and Bahasa Indonesia.

Following the wreath laying ceremony, we were invited back to the Japanese Garden for a traditional Australian morning tea of freshly baked scone, jam and cream. There Michael Mc Cormack MP spoke of how this solemn ceremony touched his heart and quoted phrases from Imam Emil's prayers as to what they meant to him. Consul

General, Pak Vedi and Mayor Paul Smith also spoke and praised AIA for the effort of organising this wonderful event which reminds us of the pointlessness loss of life that wars have caused in this world.











### **AIA Winter Warung Lunch**

In the cold wintery days of August in Sydney, a few of our members braved the weather and joined at an old favourite restaurant (Sedap Rasa in Kingsford) of AIA gatherings in the past. It was a great opportunity for us to meet and get to know new members, as well as some of our long established members.

### **Indonesia on the Beach**

Once again, the Indonesia Consulate organised a magnificent public display of Indonesian culture to the average Australian.

Located in the Bondi Pavillion and co-hosted with the newest Province of Indonesia in West Papua, a myriad of dancers, musicians, singers and games, together with a variety of Indonesian food stalls and a backdrop of magnificent images of Indonesia across the archipelago, attracted over 8,000 visitors from Bondi Beach. I observed the amazing contrast of Indonesians in beautifully coloured, traditional apparel with Aussies in their scantily clad swimming costumes enjoying the entertainment, many of whom were astonished at the diversity of Indonesia.

The Consul General invited AIA to display their becaks which proved to be the most popular photographed location as they never cease to attract onlookers, particularly Indonesians.



I congratulated the Consul General on the success of the event and encouraged him to ensure the Consulate continues to provide these public displays on an annual basis as they obviously have a great influence on the Australian public and their views of Indonesia.







## **Konjen Farewell**

The AIA has always been fortunate to enjoy a close and warm relationship with Sydney's Indonesian Consul General. We work, and sometimes play, together towards a common goal, to promote and enhance the relationship between our two countries and their people.

As is now a tradition, the Committee show their appreciation of this special relationship with the Konjen by inviting Pak Vedi and his wife, Ibu Fannie, to join us on a Sydney Harbour lunch cruise. We presented him with a few gifts, one of which is a tradition of AIA, that is, a boomerang. This symbolises AIA's anticipation that we can look forward to seeing them again when they return to Australia.







### **ANZA School Program**

The Australia New Zealand Association (ANZA) of Jakarta Student Sponsorship Program (SSP), established in 1988, provides financial assistance to enable disadvantaged Jakarta-based Indonesian children to attend schooling.

The monies are used to pay a monthly amount directly to the school on behalf of the students, and also provide stationery for the entire school, whether students are in the program or not.

The ANZA SSP program is currently centred around five main schools in Jakarta where ANZA has had good relationships with staff and students over several years.

The AIA Committee approved the funding for 10 primary school children for the 2025 ANZA program, totalling \$1,100. We have received information on each child and will be provided on their progress throughout the year.

This concludes my Report and I wish all the best to AIA for 2025 as I step down after humbly serving three years as President of an incredible organisation which has the greatest of respect.

# Treasurer's Report 2024

- All dollar figures are in AUD.
- Cash in hand as per account closing balance for 31 Dec 2024 and 8 Feb 2025 are \$22,217.77 and \$22,062.30 respectively.
- Total liquidity in all accounts is \$77,474.58.
- Refer P&L for the year ending 31 Dec 2024. Note the comparison with previous financial year's report.
- AIA operating loss for FY2024 is \$2,205.10.
- The Committee sets an operating expenditure budget of \$23,579 on the basis of securing sufficient contribution from sponsors and grants. However, it was found without NGO charitable status, income generation through sponsors and grants will be challenging.
- Thus, the Committee intentionally recalibrated our expenditures to bare minimum to conserve treasury for purposes of expected heightened expenses to be borne in 2025 associated with the 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebration and allow time to obtain NFP/DGR status.
- Accordingly, AIA has initiated application for being a Deductible Gift Recipient and Not for Profit charitable NGO from the Australian Charity and Not-for-profit Commission and ATO respectively, expecting approval by end QTR2.
- NFP/DGR status will open up eligibility to apply for more government grants on offer in 2025, to fund the various 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary events and beyond. It is hoped that it will also incentivise sponsors and individual donors to contribute.

## Indonesian Fair 2025

Each year, the Australia Indonesia Youth Association (AIYA) organize a day for NSW school children studying Bahasa Indonesia to have a day to experience the cultural delights of Indonesia. All agreed and the result was a great turn out.

Once again, we gathered at the University of Sydney on June 6 and we were joined by 200 students from 8 schools:

- Ryde Secondary College
- Mary Star of the Sea (Wollongong)
- North Ryde Boys High School
- Monte Sant Angelo mercy College
- Macarthur Anglican School
- Burwood Girls High School
- Woollahra Public School

The kickoff was a motivational speech by the Indonesian Ambassador to Australia, H.E. Dr Siswo Pramono who was quite chuffed to see so many students.

The day was full of activities for the students to join in and enjoy including:

- Traditional dancing
- Playing angklung
- Cooking Demonstration by Nick Molodysky
- Language practice sessions (including bartering)
- Playing traditional games
- Film screening

Everyone was fed a wonderful Indonesian lunch freshly prepared by Nani's Food Truck, and the kids enjoyed it immensely.

There were lots of "oleh oleh" handed out to each student in a "sample" bag for them to take home – most were eaten before they left the Uni.

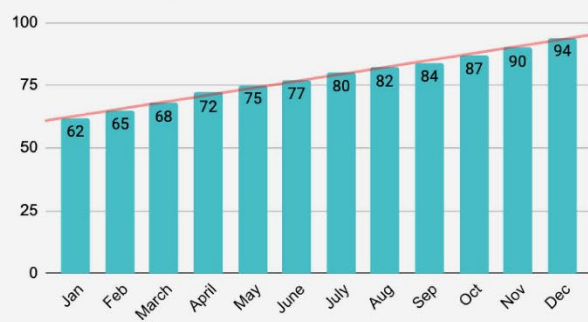

**INDONESIAN MEMORIAL CEREMONY IN COWRA, NSW**

The Australia Indonesia Association NSW (AIA) would be pleased if you could join us to celebrate Hero's Day (10th Nov) in Cowra. In 1943, about 1200 Indonesian seamen and political prisoners held in Boven Digul were sent to Australia and interned in the Prisoner of War (PoW) camp in Cowra. Before their release 13 Indonesians had died in Cowra and are now buried together in the Indonesian Section of the Cowra Cemetery. To honour the brave Indonesian freedom fighters, AIA is planning to hold a formal Wreath Laying Ceremony in Cowra at the Indonesian graves on the weekend of 9th and 10th November.



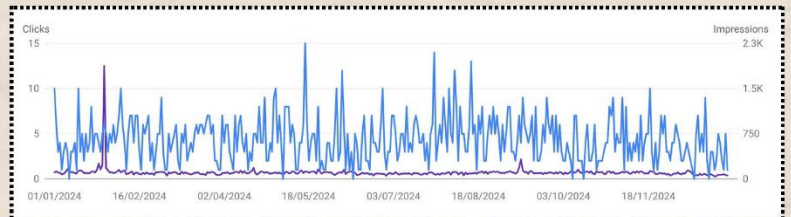

# History Sub-Committee Report 2024

## AIA Heritage Walk

The Heritage Subcommittee organised an enjoyable and enlightening 6Km walk on Sunday, October 13, 2024.

Led by AIA's Historian, Neil Smith, the walk started at the Milsons Point Station and wound around North Sydney to **Wendy's Secret Garden**, the breathtaking public botanical garden overlooking Lavender Bay. It is one of the worst-kept secrets in Sydney.

The journey continued as we walked over the Sydney Harbour Bridge, enjoying the commentary on the history of the bridge as well as the Indonesian history connected to Sydney Harbour.

The tour group visited the 1809 Fort Phillip, the 1814 Military Hospital and the exciting, and sometimes scary, history surrounding the famous Sydney Rocks area.

The tour ended with a delightful lunch at the Trust Café located within Sydney's first Military Hospital established by Governor Macquarie in 1815 on Observatory Hill.

## Indonesia-based Activities Report 2024

One of the main aims of the role of AIA's Vice President and Jakarta-based member has been to promote the background, mission and vision of the AIA of NSW, and in so doing, attract more people from overseas to join this historical organization.

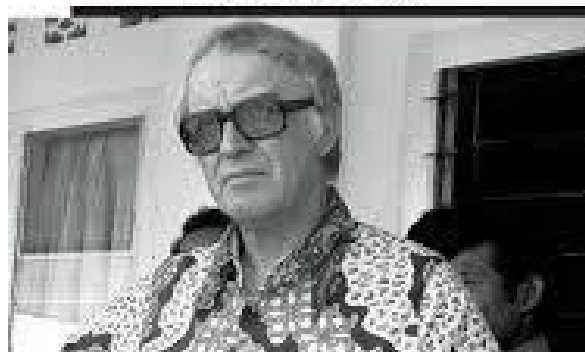
